### MINUTES OF THE ALLAMAKEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MONDAY, AUGUST 9, 2021 (UNOFFICIAL)

Board members present: Byrnes, Reiser and Schellhammer. All members voting "AYE" unless noted. Meeting called to order by Schellhammer, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

21.296-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to approve today's agenda removing fireworks permit application and the minutes from August 2, 2021. Motion carried.

The following people were present at various times throughout the meeting in person or via Zoom: Joseph Moses – Standard newspaper, Denise Beyer – Auditor and Clerk to Supervisors, Jack Knight, Matt Frana, Jon Luchsinger, Stephanie Runkle, Corey Snitker, Brian Ridenour.

Public Comment: Jack Knight asked Supervisors if they have heard about a reclamation project around the Lansing Power Plant. Auditor Beyer informed Supervisors the Vet's Club museum construction work is complete and exhibits are being worked on and they can stop over and look as they have time. Stephanie Runkle provided a copy of the final Comprehensive Plan.

21.297-Motion Reiser/Second Byrnes to approve liquor license renewal for Knotty Pine. Motion carried.

21.298-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to appoint Arla Wagner and Virgil Thorntson to the Historical Preservation Commission. Motion

carried. 21.299-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to accept and place on file Manure Management Plan updates for Dennis Gruber #7, Long View Ridge and Gruber Ridge LLC. Motion carried.

Supervisors reviewed two of the 28E agreements with non-profits. Others will be coming for approval in future meetings.

21.300-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to approve 28E agreements between Allamakee County and Northeast Iowa Community Action and between Allamakee County and Main Street Lansing. Motion carried.

Engineer Ridenour presented a Consent to Release or Receive Information for USDA NRCS Program for English Bench Site 9 Watershed. There will be no construction on English Bench watershed this year due to the lengthy process necessary after some archeology findings.

21.301-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to approve Consent to Release or Receive Information for USDA NRCS Program for English Bench Site 9 watershed. Motion carried.

Matt Frana explained a project with Dan Lyons and Mike Ferring and presented temporary, permanent and borrow easements for County approval. After construction, the county would be responsible for maintenance of stormwater detention structures. Engineer Ridenour had County Attorney review the easements. Bulk of expenses are being paid from non-county sources

with less than \$1,000 budgeted for the county share of expenses.

21.302-Motion Byrnes/Second Reiser to sign temporary, permanent and borrow easements for the Prairie Drive Stormwater Detention Structure Project. Motion carried.

Department Head/COVID-19 updates: Corey Snitker gave weather updates; previewed upcoming events in the County; the state's pushing out of their last PPE and Corey will be distributing it; and upcoming testing of national level cell phone notifications. Engineer Ridenour gave a road project update and other department updates; Canadian border is opening to vaccinated Americans. Auditor Beyer reported that tax statement preparation is nearing completion and the file should be sent to the printer today or tomorrow; upcoming special election on September 14 in City of Lansing due to no appointment made for Mayor position that was vacated when mayor resigned effective June 7. Beyer also discussed the dates for filing papers to be on the ballot for the November 2 City-School election. Schellhammer asked Snitker about vaccination availability and any back to school requirements.

### ORDINANCE NO. 693-21 AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING NEW CHAPTER 36 TO THE CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interests of the City and the residents of the City of Postville to add a new Chapter 36 (Alarm Regulation) to the City Code addressing the use and operation of fire/security and other similar alarms and to ensure the efficient use of City resources with respect to said alarms and protect the public health, safety and welfare of the City and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has deemed it necessary to add a new Chapter 36 to the City Code to carry out those objectives listed above.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POSTVILLE, IOWA:

**SECTION 1. PURPOSE.** The purpose of this ordinance is to provide regulations applicable to alarm systems and to encourage effective use of alarm systems in the City, as well as to provide additional clarity to the Police and Fire Departments responsible for responding to alarm calls and enforcing this new Chapter 36.

To further effectuate the City's purpose above, a new chapter must be added to the City Code of Ordinances for the City of Postville, Iowa.

**SECTION 2. CHAPTER ADDED.** A new Chapter 36 is hereby added to the City Code of Ordinances for the City of Postville, Iowa:

#### CHAPTER 36 ALARM REGULATION

36.01: Definitions  
36.02: Purpose  
36.03: Enforcement And Administration  
36.04: Nonliability Of City  
36.05: Penalty

**36.01 DEFINITIONS.** For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms have the respective meanings given herein:

1. ALARM COMPANY: A business providing among its services alarm sales, installation, service, monitoring or billing of alarm users or the service of receiving on a continuous basis, through trained employees, emergency signals from alarm systems, and thereafter immediately relaying the message by live voice to the emergency dispatch center or such other places as directed by the city.

2. ALARM REVIEW BOARD: A two (2) member committee selected and appointed by the mayor of Postville, to serve a four (4) year term. In the event a vacancy shall occur during the term of any member, the successor shall be appointed for the unexpired portion of the term in the same manner as the original appointment.

3. ALARM SYSTEM: Any device used to detect or prevent intrusion, criminal activity or other such emergency situation which, when activated, causes notification to be made directly or indirectly to the police department or fire department, or any such device or system designed primarily for the purpose of giving an audible or visual signal of an attempted intrusion, criminal activity, fire or other such emergency. An alarm system, for the purpose of this chapter, does not include an alarm installed on a motor vehicle.

4. ALARM SYSTEM OPERATOR: An alarm user or other person using an alarm system.

5. ALARM USER: The person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind in control of any building who owns, leases, installs or contracts for or otherwise obtains an alarm system and thereafter contracts with or hires an alarm company to monitor and/or service the alarm device, or who owns or operates an alarm system.

6. BUILDING: Any single-family housing, multi-family dwelling, apartment, commercial business, school, church, religious facility, structure or place within the city.

7. CHIEF: The police chief and/or fire chief or designated representative who is authorized by the chief to exercise any power or duty conferred to the chief under this chapter.

8. CITY: The City of Postville, Iowa.

9. COORDINATOR: An individual designated to enforce the provisions of this chapter.

10. FALSE ALARM: Any alarm signal that is activated by error or mistake, system malfunction, malicious misuse, or on purpose when an emergency situation requiring a response did not exist or about

the time of the response.

a. Error Or Mistake: Any action by an alarm user or any action by an agent or employee of the alarm user or any other person in the building which results in the activation of the alarm system when no emergency exists, and no attempt to cancel the alarm by contacting the 911 call center was made.

b. System Malfunction: Any unintentional activation of an alarm system caused by a mechanical malfunction, flaw in the design, installation or maintenance of the alarm system. This does not include any activation caused by extraordinary violent conditions of nature.

c. Malicious Misuse: Any intentional activation of an alarm system when no emergency exists.

The burden of proving that such an alarm signal was not a false alarm shall be on the alarm user.

11. MONITORING: The process by which an alarm company or its designated alarm answering service receives signals from an alarm system and relays an alarm dispatch request to the emergency dispatch center, or other places as directed by the city, for the purpose of summoning police and/or fire personnel to the building.

**36.02 PURPOSE.** It is the finding of the city council that false alarms seriously undermine the morale and safety of fire and police department personnel as well as unnecessarily expose to danger the citizens of the city who encounter emergency vehicles responding to false alarms, result in a waste of city resources, and result in citizens ignoring alarm system signals. The purpose of this chapter is to provide regulations applicable to alarm systems and to encourage the effective use of alarm systems. The most significant desired result of this chapter is to enhance public safety and more efficiently and safely use city emergency response resources by reducing the number of false alarms received.

#### 36.03 ENFORCEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION.

1. Grace Period After Installation of An Alarm System:

a. Upon the installation date of a new or replacement alarm system, a grace period of fourteen (14) calendar days will be allowed for the alarm user and alarm system operators to become familiar with the operations of the alarm system and to make corrections to the operation of the alarm system. Service charges for false alarms shall be waived during the grace period, provided the number of false alarms during the grace period is not excessive. An excessive number of false alarms is:

1. Equal to three (3) or more false alarms in one twenty-four (24) hour period.

11. Equal to six (6) or more false alarms in the first fourteen (14) calendar days since installation of the alarm system.

b. The appropriate chief, or chiefs designated representative, may waive the service charge fee for an excessive number of false alarms during the grace period, at their discretion, due to extenuating circumstances as determined on a case-by-case review.

2. Excessive False Alarms; Service Charge Fees:

a. Because a false alarm for security, intrusion, robbery and other non-fire causes usually requires police officers to respond in individual vehicular units, depending on the type of alarm, and a false alarm for fire suppression or other firefighting incidents usually requires multiple firefighters from the fire department to respond in multiple and specialized firefighting equipment, depending on the type of alarm, the city shall assess a service charge fee to any alarm user that generates an unnecessary number of false alarm responses during a calendar year as listed below ("false alarm fee"). The alarm user shall pay the city the assessed false alarm fee within twenty (20) days of the date an invoice is given to the alarm user for any false alarm created by the alarm user's alarm system in accordance with the following schedule:

The first and second false alarms during a calendar year: \$0.00

The third false alarm during a calendar year: \$75.00

The fourth false alarm during a calendar year: \$100.00

The fifth false alarm and each false alarm thereafter during a calendar year: \$150.00

b. After the second false alarm, the alarm user shall receive a writ-

ten notice from the chief. The notice shall require that by a specified date the alarm user shall have his/her alarm system inspected by an alarm company and alarm user shall review operational procedures with the alarm system operator and any other individuals having access to the use and operation of the alarm system. Notice or billing from the city to any alarm user shall be deemed to have been given or rendered on the date such notice or billing is deposited in the U.S. mail, first class postage, addressed to the alarm user at the address shown for the alarm user. The alarm user shall notify the applicable chief, in writing, after the inspection by the alarm company has been completed, and shall provide to the chief a copy of any report of service, repair or inspection of the alarm system given by the alarm company. Inspection of the alarm system as required by this subsection does not relieve the alarm user of responsibility for subsequent false alarms pursuant to the service charge schedule outlined above.

3. Appeal Process for False Alarm Service Charges:

An alarm user assessed a false alarm fee may appeal the false alarm fee in writing to the alarm review board. The filing of an appeal with the alarm review board stays the assessment of the false alarm fee until the alarm review board makes a final decision.

a. The alarm user shall file a written appeal to the alarm review board by setting forth the reasons for the appeal within ten (10) days after receipt of the false alarm fee invoice. The alarm review board will review relevant information, including conditions of nature for the date and time of the occurrence of the false alarm. The alarm review board may reverse the assessment of the false alarm fee only if there was no false alarm or the false alarm was not contributed to by the act(s) or omission(s) of the alarm user and/or the alarm user's family, pets, guests, employee(s) and/or invitees.

b. The alarm review board shall notify the alarm user of its decision within five (5) working days.

The decision of the alarm review board is final as to administrative remedies of the city.

**36.04 NONLIABILITY OF CITY.** The city shall not be liable for any defects in the operation of any alarm system, for any failure or neglect to respond appropriately upon receipt of an alarm from such a source, for any failure or neglect of any person in connection with the installation, operation, disconnection or removal of equipment, the transmission of alarm signals or the relaying of such signals or messages.

#### 36.99 PENALTY.

Any alarm user who violates and provision of this chapter not otherwise covered by this chapter is guilty of a municipal infraction punishable pursuant to section 3.03 of this code. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the city from establishing a written schedule of civil penalties to be imposed for certain violations in this chapter so long as such penalties are less than or within the acceptable range provided for in section 3.03.

**SECTION 4. REPEALER** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.** If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
