tion. Savings per year for electricity at the Public Safety Center would be about \$11,000 at today's rates. Investor is responsible for the system, unless/until the County buys it. If County wants system removed after 25 years, that is the responsibility of the investor. Panels would be fenced in by Alliant. At year 25 the system is rated to produce about 80% of what it produced when new. New bi-facial panels can pick up solar reflecting off the ground. This option is an investor decision. Timeline for installation from start to finish is 5-6 months. No up-front costs to the County. Insurance can be done 2 ways - investor insuring it or the County insuring it. There is a grant cycle coming up that could help the investor offset some initial costs.
