MINUTES OF THE ALLAMAKEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 2023 (UNOFFICIAL)

Board members present: Byrnes, Reiser and Keatley. All members voting "AYE" unless noted.

Meeting called to order by Byrnes, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

23.333-Motion Keatley/Second Reiser to approve today's agenda and the minutes with changes for September 5, 2023. Motion carried.

The following people were present at various times throughout the meeting in person: Joseph Moses – Standard newspaper, Denise Beyer – Auditor and Clerk to Supervisors, Sheri Penney, Amy Bresnahan, Jacob Dougherty, Stephanie Runkle, Paul Wagner, Chad Gappa – Motorola, Clark Mellick, Chris Fee, Corey Snitker, Stuart Bloxham, Brian Ridenour, Teri Orr, Darin Svenson, Val Reinke, Michelle Barness, Rachelle Howe, Kristy Turner, Brenda Hackman, Nancy Everman – Postville ChildCare Board member, Krista Jacobson – Postville Child-Care Board President.

Public Comment: None

Chris Fee explained the presentation Chad Gappa, Motorola, will be giving today. Gappa proceeded to explain the ISICS (Iowa Statewide Inoperable Communications System) radio system, which he also presented about a month ago to E-911 Board; here today to make BOS aware of what is coming for budgetary purposes. The State of Iowa contracted with Motorola in 2015 to build this statewide system. ISICS platform has 95% mobile coverage statewide; local control; no user fees other than buying the equipment. Also, system upgraded every 2 years for all local jurisdictions. ISICS is being used in every county in some way right now. Gappa has tested coverage around the county with Sheriff Mellick and E-911 Chris Fee. Gappa covered benefits of ISICS and trainings provided. Police, fire and dispatch can use ISICS, as well as roads, schools and other entities. Funding options were discussed. Waukon Police Chief Paul Wagner said the Waukon PD does use ISICS at times. Sheriff Mellick is not against it, however given the coverage issues in Allamakee County, Mellick would like to bring in a neutral contractor to do a radio assessment of what the county has now and where we could go in the future; problems they could have with VHF system; would like to be able to look

at all options and make a decision moving forward; and if we're going to move forward Mellick would like to see it be usable for all law, fire, EMS, Secondary Roads and Schools - to be able to access talk groups; and would like to see 95% coverage but is unsure how many tower sites will we need to be able to achieve that. Chris Fee, E-911, inquired about expenses to the county with 2-year upgrades. Mellick asked if Motorola engineers would be able to create a coverage map to give us an idea how many towers will be needed to get 95% - Gappa said Motorola can provide this as not cost. Cost is \$1.5-2.5M per tower to put ISICS equipment on existing towers and \$2.5-3M to put up a new tower.

Moved 10:00 item to end of meeting.

Val Reinke introduced the 10:10 item regarding a Child Care funding opportunity. Sheri Penney, Iowa Womens Foundation, works with people on childcare funding and has targeted 12 communities for intergovernmental transfer of ARPA funds for childcare through an HHS grant. Postville is one of the 12 communities. Michelle Barness with UERPC gave numbers and statistics related to child care shortages in Allamakee County, wages of daycare center staff in Allamakee County, staff shortages, costs of daycare to working families vs wages/salaries. Kristy Turner, Director of Postville Child Care shared it is difficult for centers to continually ask families for more money for their services; their workers make an average of \$10.73/hour and there is high turnover. The Health and Human Services (HHS) grant is to bring child care worker wages to a "livable wage" of \$16.28/hour. Postville Child Care is requesting financial support from County Supervisors in the amount of \$275,000 and \$200,000 more from private businesses/entities. Turner explained efforts that have been made with 4 local Postville businesses contributing to support the daycare's efforts to keep their doors open; explained the changes in revenue over the past 5-7 years, and challenges related to serving younger children due to ratios and if this service is discontinued, some parents would be forced to stay home to care for these children, which in turn causes local employers to lose employees. HHS grant has a deadline of September 30. If this grant is not received, Postville Child-care Center could potentially close doors in March 2024 and employ-

ees would lose jobs and families of their 59 children served would be impacted. Teri Orr expressed support and reiterated the need; Sherri Penney thanked Supervisors for listening and considering the request. Rachelle Howe reiterated the importance of childcare for working families and with many daycare providers retiring or changing careers, there is an ever-growing need.

No action taken on agenda item regarding septic installation bids for 1480 Hwy 9 – no bids were received. Stephanie Runkle will inquire with county attorney's office how to proceed.

No action taken on additional expense total for sidewalk project. The bid covered the sidewalks and that amount was lower than bid. Extra amounts for parking lot repairs is approved with approval of today's claims. The total was still under the total obligated from ARPA funds.

23.334-Motion Reiser/Second Keatley to accept and place on file Manure Management Plan update for Ahlstrom Hollow Site. Motion carried.

Department Head updates: Ridenour notified Supervisors of pre-construction meeting 1:00pm Thursday at TJ Hunters in Lansing for Black Hawk bridge replacement project. Corey Snitker gave update on FEMA for Mississippi flooding; Hazard Mitigation plan approved by FEMA and he will be meeting with necessary jurisdictions regarding adoption of plan; working with fire chiefs on a potential burn ban; upcoming ATV/UTV rides and other events; fire drill for courthouse on Tuesday October 10. Sheriff Mellick gave department update including K-9 golf tournament fundraiser on September 23; Racom coming to E-911 meeting to present this week. Auditor Beyer gave department update including HF718 property tax reform meeting in Des Moines this week and election preparation.

Supervisors and Auditor Beyer moved into a work session with several still present regarding the Postville Childcare Center funding request. Chair Dan Byrnes reviewed projects that have been discussed, but funds not yet allocated from ARPA dollars. Postville Childcare request was discussed with Supervisor Keatley and Reiser stating they feel the Safety Center water system; courthouse projects are a priority and benefit the entire county. Supervisor Byrnes commented that childcare does affect several communities, but

the costs of the courthouse projects are still unknown and funding these projects has always been the goal with the ARPA funds. Engineer Ridenour gave some road projects that could be done with ARPA and equipment prices for Secondary Roads equipment that needs to be replaced this coming year. Ridenour and Chris Fee stated that E-911 signs put up in 1998 are needing to be replaced with estimated costs at \$250,000 for about 5,000. Kristy Turner made a final comment that Postville was viewed as a community that is engaging and that is why HHS has identified Postville as a community eligible for these grant funds – but the funding is dependent on community support. Michelle Barness, UERPC, asked if ARPA funds is the only option for the county to support this request. Keatley spoke about property tax reform and the potential negative financial impact it could have on the county. Kristy Turner then asked Supervisors if they would be willing to contact businesses by September 30 to ask for their support, in lieu of county funding, since the daycare issue affects everyone and needs the support of everyone and confirmed this request is a one-time request. Rachelle Howe discussed other options for funding some of the county projects, such as CDBG grants and ACCF grants, to keep ARPA dollars available for intended county projects. Use of ARPA funds for E-911 road sign replacement was discussed.

Use of LOSST funds was discussed, and ballot language from 2014 LOSST election was reviewed. Consensus is to keep the amounts the same. Auditor Beyer will look at what is needed and the deadlines for resolutions from Supervisors regarding the upcoming LOSST election to be held in March 2024.

Opioid funds were briefly discussed with nothing new other than Sheriff Mellick and Attorney Gericke have talked briefly about a consortium of counties going together to do something with the funds.

The petition request is in consideration of a Variance in order to have a slab for a wood stove and an addition on the South side of existing building with a 0' Side Yard Setback, where a 10' would be required. The property is zoned A-1, Agricultural.

A petition for a Variance has been filed by Jeremy and Jeni Kolsrud at 1636 Oak Lane, Waukon IA. The petition request is in consideration of a Variance in order to have a 36' x 48' shed with a 5' Rear Yard Setback, where a 20' would be required. The property is zoned R-1, Residential.

Under the provision of the Zoning Ordinance the Board of Adjustment, under certain conditions and safeguards, have the authority to grant these requests if they feel

the applicant meets the standards established in the ordinance. 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ORDINANCE NO. 1403-23 • CITY OF POSTVILLE

ORDINANCE NO. 1403-23 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 63 (SPEED REGULATIONS) OF THE POSTVILLE, IOWA CODE OF ORDINANCES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POSTVILLE, IOWA:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend certain provisions of Chapter 63 of the City Code to ensure the public safety and protection of public and private property by regulating the vehicular speed of vehicles traveling on public alleyways within the corporate limits of the City of Postville, Iowa.

SECTION 2. SECTIONS AMENDED. Chapter 63 is hereby amended as follows, with underlined text indicating language added and struck through language indicating removal:

CHAPTER 63 SPEED REGULATIONS 63.03 PARKS, CEMETERIES, AND PARKING LOTS, AND ALLEYWAYS. A speed in excess of fifteen (15) miles per hour in any public park, cemetery, alleyway, or

parking lot, unless specifically designated otherwise in this chapter, is unlawful.

(Code of Iowa, Sec. 321.236[5] and [11])

SECTION 3. REPEALER. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law. PASSED AND APPROVED this 11 day of September, 2023.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF POSTVILLE, IOWA SEPTEMBER 11, 2023

1. A regular meeting of the City Council of Postville, Iowa, in the Council Chambers at 147 N. Lawler St. On September 11, 2023, beginning at 7:00 p.m. with Dennis Koenig presiding.

2. On call of the roll, the following Council Members were present: Rebecca Engelhardt, Mary Engstrom, Ross Malcom, Devora Klein-Mahr and Larry Moore. Absent: None.

3. Council Member Engelhardt made a motion to approve the agenda as posted by the Clerk. Seconded by Moore. Carried 4:0.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all in attendance. Mayor Koenig requested a moment of silence to honor the victims of 911.

4. Allamakee Co Economic Development Director Val Reinke informed the City Council of the County Housing Study which is done every five years in the County. The survey is currently available and is being paid for with housing trust fund dollars. The survey is required to apply for grant funding. Reinke requested the council take the survey and help to get the word encouraging citizens to take the survey.

5. Corey Snitker, Allamakee Co Emergency Management addressed the council with the final county hazard mitigation plan. Council Member Engstrom made a motion adopt Resolution #1404-23 A Resolution Adopting Allamakee Co Iowa Multi-Jurisdiction (MJ-7) Multi- Hazard Mitigation Plan. Seconded by Mahr. The roll was called ayes: Engelhardt, Engstrom, Malcom, Mahr and Moore. Nays: None. Carried 5:0.

6. Michelle Barness, UERPC, address the Council with data on child care in Allamakee County. Kristy Turner, Postville Child Care Administrator address the council in regards to a grant opportunity thru the State Health and Human Services for a wage enhancement grant with Allamakee Co/Postville one of twelve communities in state chosen which requires a 50% match with a deadline to secure funds by September 30, 2023 funding would be allocated thru Allamakee County Economic Development. Turner provided a financial statement for the center and informed the City Council that if \$300,000 of funding is not secured the center will have to close by March 2024. Turner requested each council member reach out to three people and see if they could help. Council Member Malcom requested the city review the budget for funding. A budget work session will be held on September 25, 2023 at 6 p.m.

7. Council Member Malcom made a motion to table the budget amendment FY 23/24. Seconded by Mahr. Carried 5:0.

8. Discussion was held on establishing a mobile food ordinance. The city attorney will draft for review at the October 9, 2023.

9. Council Member Moore made a motion to approve the engineering agreement of Veenstra & Kimm in the amount of \$9,450 for solar at the Waste Water Treatment Facility. Seconded by Malcom. Carried 5:0.

10. Council Member Moore made a motion to approve the change to the water line project removing 686 W. Tilden and 685 W Tilden from the project due to no easement being granted from the property owner. Seconded by Engelhardt. Carried 5:0.

11. Council Member Mahr made a motion to draft an ordinance changing Chapter 65 to add a stop sign on Oak Drive at the intersection of Hill St and Cheryl St. Seconded by Engstrom. Ayes: Engelhardt, Engstrom, Malcom and Mahr. Nays: Moore. Carried 4:1.

12. Council Member Malcom made a motion to approve Ordinance #1403-23 An Ordinance Amending Chapter 63 (Speed Regulations) of the Postville, Iowa Code of Ordinances. Seconded Engelhardt. The roll was called ayes: Englehardt, Engstrom, Malcom, Mahr and Moore. Nays: None. Carried 5:0.
